## **CREATION GLORIFIES GOD**

Psalm 19

## WHY DID GOD CREATE EVERYTHING? GOD CREATED EVERYTHING FOR HIS GLORY AND OUR GOOD.

King David loved God. He wrote a psalm to celebrate how great God is. This is what he wrote:

"The heavens show us the glory of God. When we look up into the sky we can see what God created. The message that they show us about God is seen by all the people of the world.

"We can see God's glory in the movement of the sun. It rises in the same place every morning and then sets at the end of the day in another place. Everyone and everything can feel its heat."

## David continued:

"What God says is trustworthy. The Lord's instructions make our hearts glad. They are more desirable than pure gold and they are sweeter than fresh honey. When they are kept, there is great reward.

"God, clean up our hidden flaws. Keep your servant from choosing to sin too, and don't let sin be in control. I want everything I think or say to be acceptable to You, Lord, my rock and my Redeemer."

Christ Connection: All of creation displays the glory of God—how great He is—although not perfectly. The perfect revelation of God's glory is found in Jesus, who came to show us exactly what God is like. Because Jesus is God, He is the perfect display of God's glory.
